Memorial Day 2022

A Memorial Day service was held at the Ohio Veterans Home in Sandusky in front of the I.F. Mack building on May 30.

Kimberly Lewallen, Volunteer Coordinator, served as mistress of ceremonies leading the guest speakers, bands, veteran organizations, honor guards and parade participants through the service. Remarks were given by Ross Matlack, OVH Superintendent, and State Representative DJ Swearingen. Fr. Doug Taylor and Rev. Rena Baker provided the invocation and benediction, respectively. Student speakers Ashlyn Beatty from Perkins High School, Kathleen May from Sandusky High School, and Lance Powell from Sandusky Central Catholic, spoke on the meaning of Memorial Day. Alison Risk, from Perkins, recited Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

A longtime OVH volunteer, Al Lonz served as the Grand Marshal. Lonz served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1967 to 1971 where he was stationed at Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, South Carolina, and Marine Corps Air Station, Iwakuni, Japan.

He served in Chu Lai Vietnam from 1969 to 1970 with VMFA-314 Black Knights F-4 Phantom Marine Fighter Attacks Squadron and was credited with the Navy Presidential Unit Citation.

Lonz graduated from Sandusky in 1965. He and his wife, Linda, are lifelong Sandusky residents.

After his military service, Lonz worked for more than 28 years in the home building and construction fields. He attended Holy Angels Catholic Church, where he served as president on the Holy Name Society for 30-plus years.

Lonz is currently involved with many local veterans service organizations, including AMVETS Post 17, American Legion Post 83, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2529, Commander of the Catholic War Veterans Post 1905, Disabled American Veterans Chapter 49, president of the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 774, adjutant/paymaster of the Marine Corps League Detachment 1192, trustee with the Firelands Military Vehicle Group, Erie County Veterans Memorial Park committee board member, treasurer of the Sandusky Memorial Day Parade Committee, chairman/treasurer of the Ohio Veterans Home Volunteer advisory committee, medical transportation driver with the Erie County Veterans Service office,

Did You Know?

The Ohio Veterans Home is home to approximately 20 beautiful peacocks.

In the 1920's, peacocks were donated to the grounds of the care facility and have been at the home ever since. Though they can fly out of the large courtyard where they stay, the male peacocks and female peahens continue to make themselves comfortable.

"It is a unique feature here,"
Matlack said about the birds. "This is their home, too. They're free to leave, but they never go anywhere."

Jeff Rapp, a home spokesman, provided some background on Jones, who resides at the Sandusky-area Ohio Veterans Home:

Cole was born July 27, 1922, in Athens, Ohio.

He and his family worked in the coal mines.

He served in the U.S. Army from April 2, 1943, to March 3, 1946, much of the service during World War II. He was honorably discharged as a Master Sergeant.

Cole graduated from The Ohio State University with a degree in political science.

He was employed in the fundraising arena, taking on causes related to social change during the Civil Rights Movement.

He was employed in urban development in the 1960s, and his primary duty was to relocate families and businesses in developing cities.

He also worked for the United Negro College Fund, organizing and promoting events for fundraising to an audience including government officials and senators.

In his many roles, he lived mainly in Cleveland and Columbus.

Cole was admitted to the Ohio Veterans home on Feb. 14, 2019.

Still mentally sharp and fun-loving, Cole is very popular among the residents and has a ready smile for all he encounters.
